Appointments

The Vice-Chairperson and the Department are working with the Missouri Boards and Commissions office to fill five vacant positions. By the end of FY2021, several applications were being reviewed and needed documents were being acquired. The Department anticipates appointments will be made early in FY2022. Once appointments are made, Senate confirmation will follow which usually occurs in January.

Activities

In November 2020, Peter Nicastro led the Committee and partners in a SWOT/SSC (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats/Stop, Start, Continue) exercise. Feedback was requested. Once all information is received and analyzed, Mr. Nicastro will present the findings at a future meeting.

The Committee monitored the Organ Donor Program Fund balance and several registry data points, engaged with donor families through the annual Donor Family Recognition Program, gathered input from partners about activities and concerns, and provided feedback to the Department about pending legislation that may impact organ, eye, and tissue donation.

The Governor's Organ Donation Advisory Committee recommends expenditure priorities from the Organ Donor Program Fund; assists in the development of organ donor awareness programs; and submits an annual report of activities and recommendations to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Director of the Department of Health and Senior Services (<u>RSMo 194.297, 194.299, and 194.302</u>). The Committee is dedicated to this service through collaboration with partners across the state.

Fifth Annual Donor Family Recognition Program by Rachel Allen

Plans for the 6th Annual Donor Family Recognition event started in August of 2020. With the COVID-19 pandemic still crippling the world, the committee decided to plan for another virtual event. The theme for the 2021 event was "Garden of Life."

The committee made preparations for the event by orchestrating a video and creating a packet to send to donor families who RSVP'd to the event. Families who RSVP'd to the event were encouraged to send in a photograph of their loved one to be incorporated into the video. The committee was fortunate to have people across the state wanting to contribute to the 2021 event. Each packet that was mailed out included redbud tree seeds donated by the Missouri Department of Conservation, a coloring book and crayons donated by Camryn Crist, Miss Route 66's Outstanding Teen, adult coloring pages, Donor Family pins donated by a donor family, a Certificate of Life, and a link to the virtual event.

Following suit with previous years, the virtual event was held on the second Tuesday of April. 


Transplant Assistance

The Missouri Kidney Program (MoKP) is a state funded organization with a mission of "offering supportive resources and quality service to Missourians with endstage renal disease, while exhibiting financial stewardship in the management of all resources." The Dashboard featured here demonstrates how FY21 funding was used in support of Missourians with end-stage renal disease. MoKP assistance programs include the centralized drug program, transportation reimbursement, private premium reimbursement, medication co-pays, and transplant assistance.

In FY21, MoKP made a concerted effort in cultivating relationships with transplant centers in Missouri. Encouraging the use of transplant assistance offered by

MoKP has resulted in increased use of this fund for FY21. As part of the transplant assistance, MoKP reimburses for non-medical related expenses for a transplant recipient and/or a living donor. This can include lost wages due to time off from surgery and travel expenses. There are many barriers to transplant and these funds help alleviate those barriers. The transplant assistance from MoKP will reimburse up to \$1,000 for each applicant.

MoKP continues to foster relationships with the transplant centers and dialysis clinics in the state while exploring other opportunities to support the chronic kidney disease community. To learn more about MoKP, visit <u>www.mokp.</u> <u>org</u>.

Educating High School Students in Missouri | learnlifesavers.com

<u>Gift of Life</u> has an in-person classroom program called <u>Life Savers</u>. Staff and volunteers present information to high school students so they can learn about organ, eye, and tissue donation and then be able to make an informed decision regarding donation. The program's reach was limited.

So, how do we reach the goal of educating all high school students in the state of Missouri regarding organ, eye, and tissue donation? This question was proposed to the GODAC subcommittee for high school outreach in 2016. The answer was not simple. Since the Life Savers program existed, developing an on-line version of Life Savers seemed logical. A subcommittee formed, and the team took on the challenge to reach the goal of educating high school students across the state. The team held many discussions and work sessions to iron out a multitude of logistics including, adapting content, making a program that was both informative and teacher friendly, and respectful of parents and donors.

In 2018, legislation passed which gave the GODAC subcommittee the ability to present the <u>Learn Life Savers</u> program to Missouri school boards. The decision about program implementation would be with the local school districts. Our measure of success: the number of school boards that vote in favor to implement the program into



their curricula.

In 2019, the subcommittee team took the Life Savers program, customized it to an on-line teacher-guided lesson plan with resources, and named it <u>Learn Life</u> <u>Savers</u>. The on-line program is available with just one click (<u>learnlifesavers.com</u>) and is free of charge. With both the in-person Life Savers and the on-line <u>Learn Life Savers</u> programs, the goal to educate all high school students in the state is attainable.

Then COVID-19 arrived in Missouri and postponing presentations until early 2021 was the right thing to do. The response so far has been positive. The team's short-term goal for the 2021-2022 school year is to present to 50 school district boards of education.

Presenting to every school board across the state will be no simple task. If our efforts save lives and increases awareness about organ, eye, and tissue donation, then the journey is worth it!

Reaching Audiences in MTN's Service Area and Beyond

The 2021 Donate Life Legacy Walk brought the return of a free, in-person event to Midwest Transplant Network's (MTN's) donor service area. After a highly engaging and successful virtual walk in 2020, MTN brought the virtual component of the event back and celebrated donation at the National WWI Museum and Memorial in Kansas City, Missouri, for the first time. This hybrid model allowed people to participate from all over the world, including 14 U.S. states, Washington, D.C., Mexico, and Spain.

The new Tribute Trail provided great opportunities to celebrate the gift of life. MTN honored 98 donor heroes, recipients and donation advocates with signs and photos in memory of donors along the walking path.

The week of the Legacy Walk, MTN also spread the message of organ, eye, and tissue donation around the Kansas City metro area by lighting several buildings including Union Station — and dyeing fountains green. MTN displayed informational signage corresponding with the fountains that went green to educate passersby about the importance of donation.

Legacy Garden: Honoring the Gift in a Virtual Way




In 2020, Saving Sight created a virtual memorial via Instagram.

Missouri Department of Revenue by Gina Wisch

Beginning in June 2020 the Missouri Department of Revenue (DOR) implemented a new driver license and identification card format which provides a new background design and security features. This includes special indicators such as the donor symbol. Information about the REAL ID or the new card design can be found at www.dor.mo.gov.

The DOR implemented a REAL ID compliant driver license or nondriver license program in March 2019. The REAL ID full compliance deadline was extended by the Department of Homeland Security until May 2023.

The DOR Motor Vehicle and Driver Licensing Division and its contract license offices continue to be active partners in enrolling registry participants and in collecting contributions to support the registry and program efforts. Every applicant should be given the opportunity to enroll or make a contribution. The DOR has implemented processes to provide record holders the option of enrolling in an electronic notification program where they may elect to receive future driver and vehicle renewal notices via text/SMS or email. Learn more at <u>https://</u> mydmv.mo.gov/electronicnotifications. Individuals may also request a "Be An Organ Donor" specialty motor vehicle license plate to show their support of organ donation. As of November 2020 there were 589 active donor plates on Missouri vehicles. Interested individuals can <u>learn</u> how to obtain this specialty license plate by clicking <u>here</u>.

The DOR values the importance of organ, eye, and tissue donation and helps keep local license offices informed about the process and address questions through electronic notices and in-person site visits made by regional customer service managers.

The DOR will continue to partner and help serve Missourians who have made the decision to be an organ, eye, and tissue donor or direct them to the Department of Health and Senior Serivces for any questions, concerns, or other registry actions.

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) continues to be an active partner in enrolling participants into the Donate Life Missouri Registry through our on-line hunting and fishing permit purchasing portal. Once a hunter or fisher completes their MDC on-line permit application, they have the opportunity to click on and enroll into the Donate Life Missouri Registry.

In 2021, MDC continued sponsorship of the Donor Family Recognition program by providing redbud tree seeds for donor families to plant in memory of their loved one. The Eastern redbud is a small ornamental tree that blooms in the spring and grows statewide.










